GALA MAE 18.30-21.00

Join us to celebrate the launch of Bare Lit 2018 with a neverbefore-seen workshop performance of *Gala Mae*, a play by **Annette Brook** produced in collaboration with **Matchstick Theatre**.

Set in a bustling night club in 1950s Soho and present-day London, the play follows the lives of two mixed-race sisters. Raised in a children's home, when one of the sisters eventually ends up in an old people's home, the other decides to rescue her sibling, persuading her with memories of their colourful, spirited past.

Annette Brook completed the Royal Court's Young Writers' Programme and 'Invitation' group in 2008 and was a mentee on the Jerwood/Arvon programme in 2015-16. Her plays include *Make You Mine* (Soho Theatre, 2010) which was shortlisted for the Blue Elephant Theatre Playwriting Competition 2016; *Gala Mae*, longlisted for the 2016 Alfred Fagon Award; and the Penned in the Margins-commissioned *The Marriage of Lady Mede* which was part of a five-hour retelling of the medieval poem Piers Plowman. Annette is Communications Manager for The Royal Society of Literature.

Join us for the annual Keynote by award-winning writer **Nii Ayikwei Parkes**.

Nii Ayikwei Parkes is a writer, editor and socio-cultural commentator. He is the author of the internationally-translated hybrid novel, *Tail of the Blue Bird*, of which the French translation won the 2014 Prix Baudelaire, Prix Mahogany and Prix Laure Bataillon. He was recently the Royal Literary Fund Fellow at the University of Aberystwyth and was selected as one of Africa's 39 most promising authors of the new generation for the World Book Capital Africa 39 Project.

Nii Ayikwei writes for children under the name K. P. Kojo and spends his time in Europe – where he is the senior editor for flipped eye publishing – and in Ghana, where he was the founding director of the Ama Ata Aidoo Centre for Creative Writing in 2017. He is currently working on a crowdfunded collection of short stories, *The City Will Love You* (Unbound, 2018).

The Royal Literary Fund was set up in 1790 to help professional authors. Past beneficiaries have included Samuel Taylor Coleridge, Joseph Conrad, DH Lawrence and Dylan Thomas. In 1999 a Fellowship scheme was established to place writers in universities to help students with their writing skills. Since it began it has placed 450 writers in posts at 120 higher education institutions across the UK.
